

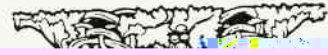

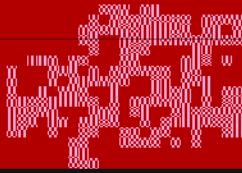

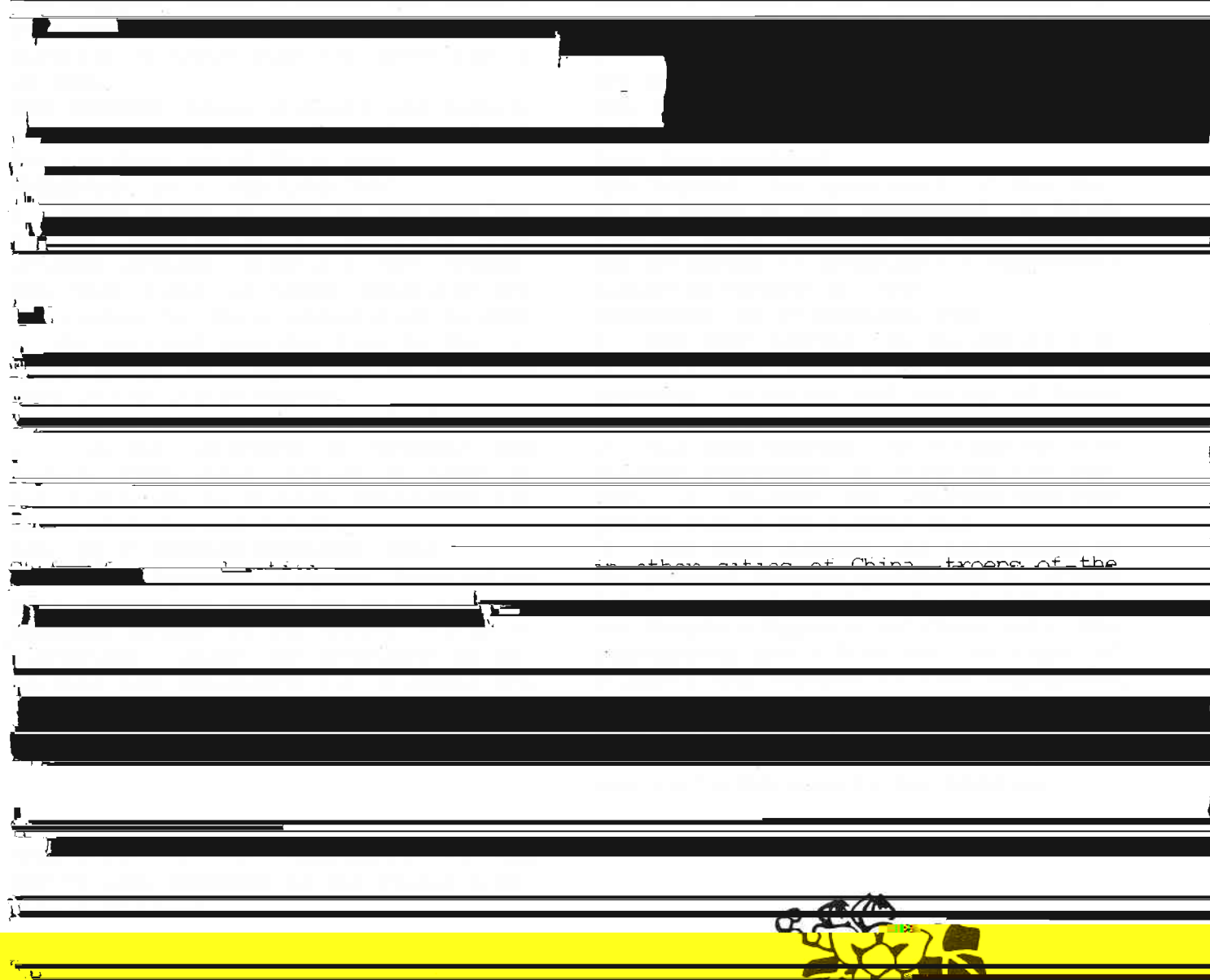

The third edition of this directory will be welcomed by those wanting to expand their base of sources for children's books. It identifies 139 publishers (55 new to this edition) meeting the Center's definition of "alternative": "an independent publisher unaffiliated with national or multinational corporations or agencies.
