RESOLUTION

The following resolution was passed with five abstentions. It was agreed that this release be made to the local press with the request that it be posted in the service of the library to be sent to members of Congress and SRRT's Action Council.

Whereas we are opposed to the Vietnam war and its extension into Cambodia; and

Whereas we support the Cooper-Church amendment;

Whereas we are opposed to the extension of the military-industrial complex;

Therefore, we urge the United States Congress to exercise its rightful authority to limit the power to intervene militarily in foreign countries to direct attack on the part of Congress except in response to a direct attack on the United States.
