

and WHEREAS we remember the man to answered the question "What kind of society do you want anyhow?":


The answer I propose is: that the society I want is based on a universalizing principle, I want for all, is a society which protects, promotes, and respects the individual.

SIPAPU: A TUNNEL CONNECTING TWO WORLDS: In the kivas of the Southwest, the round huts used by Pueblo and other Indians for religious ceremonies, there is a hole, usually receiving the sacred fire, and through it, the sipapu, for a tunnel to the other world. Through this underground passage, the people of the pueblos are said to have passed from their subterranean prison; through it the spirits of the dead pass, and to this day, the sipapu connects the world of the spirit and the world of everyday reality. We hope the name SIPAPU will connect in our readers' minds the world of the ethnic minority and racism with the mystical world of the hippie, and the world of the librarian and scholar alert to the subterranean shift in our country's politics.
